ROBERT A. MOCNY



Robert A. Mocny is the Deputy Director, Technology and Innovation at the Federal Protective Service. Mr. Mocny is responsible for overseeing the intersection of technology, acquisition, and information technology as it relates to the Federal Protective Service cyber-physical mission. Prior to this, Mr. Mocny was the Director of the United States Visitor and Immigrant Status Indicator Technology (US-VISIT) Program and led the development of DHS' biometric identity program. In April 2013, Mr. Mocny was detailed to the DHS Office of Policy performing the duties of a Deputy Assistant Secretary where he established the inaugural Five Country Ministerial for the Secretary of Homeland Security. Currently, he leads the newly formed Information Sharing Policy Office within the reorganized Office of Policy and is responsible for developing policies governing how DHS enters into international information sharing agreements; establishing an international information sharing architecture; and

negotiating agreements and arrangements with international partners.

Prior to his current responsibilities, Mr. Mocny served in senior positions within the former Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS), including Director of the Entry/Exit Project, acting Assistant Commissioner for Inspections, and Special Assistant to the Deputy Commissioner. While at INS, he led an interagency project team that established the Secure Electronic Network for Traveler's Rapid Inspection (SENTRI) Program.

Mr. Mocny is a graduate of the University of California, Santa Barbara. He has received numerous awards throughout his career, including a team Hammer Award from former U.S. Vice President Al Gore for the SENTRI program and the Smithsonian's Computer World award for the innovative use of information technology.
